



Staff Raises Money for Yearbook

cTeacher Night made a comeback after a threeyear absence and the turnout was incredible. The event has traditionally served as the major fundraiser for the KHS journalism program, and this year was no exception. Thanks to McDonald's and many of their generous patrons, the program earned \$2,300.

McDonald's has hosted the event on Trout Festival Thursday for many of the last 17 years. The main draw is that students of all ages can come to see high school teachers taking orders and cooking their dinners at McDonald's. As if that wasn't a big enough attraction, the journalism class distributed coloring pages to the elementary schools, so that every child who colored it and brought it in received a free children's ice cream cone.

Teachers worked in all areas of the restaurant. The journalism students sold pies, also donated by McDonald's, to anyone inside or in the drive—thru line for donations. Pie sales alone brought in \$400. Franchise owner Tom Holka and McDonald's donated \$1,900 to the cause.

"I am overwhelmed by the generosity of the community and McDonald's," said journalism adviser Stacey Hicks. Although this is Hicks' fourth year teaching in Kalkaska, this was her first McTeacher Night. "I had no idea how well it would do, but this is well beyond my expectations."

Not only were teachers working the event, but many came in to eat and make donations, as well. Students and families stopped by in droves to have a great dinner, check out the new McDonald's building, and donate to the cause.

"It was nice to see everyone come and see the teachers help out," said sophomore Carly Arsnoe, a yearbook staff member.

Fifth grade students had their final classroom visit with Mr. Paul Wiemerslage from the AuSable Institute. Students have had the opportunity to discover native plants in our area, explore the importance of biodiversity, and learn the key factors of establishing a healthy ecosystem. Students have successfully completed nine learning sessions as part of the REYS program and will be conducting their final project later this month. Our students will help establish a healthy ecosystem along the Boardman River where a bridge was recently reconstructed.

Our fifth grade students are preparing for their transition to Kalkaska Middle School. One way our students have been preparing is through exploring the idea of joining our middle school band. Students have had the option to try several instruments to see which ones grab their interest for the upcoming year.

The fifth grade students and many chaperones are preparing to explore Mackinac Island this upcoming June. Students have been learning about many different things about the island and have made many connections to our curriculum. Recently, our students were able to visit with a historian from the fort to discuss how the land that would become Michigan impacted the American Revolution. While on the island, students will have the opportunity to visit Fort Mackinac, enjoy a carriage ride focused on native plants, and enjoy the many joys of Mackinac Island.
