- Spectators arriving after 6:50 p.m. will be directed to the balcony for the ceremony. Please arrive prior to 6:50 p.m. if you would like seating in the lower level bleachers.
- Anyone requiring handicap seating or wheelchair seating should contact the KHS office at (231) 258–9167 prior to May 24.
- Please limit movement into and out of the gym to emergencies once the ceremony has started.
- Kalkaska Public Schools are alcohol, drug, nicotine, and tobacco free. There is no consumption of alcohol, smoking, or vaping allowed on the premises. Spectators who are participating in any of these activities will be escorted out of the building.

No pets are allowed. If you have a service animal that must attend the ceremony with you, please contact the high school at (231) 258–9167 to make appropriate arrangements. Proof of current vaccinations (including rabies) and service dog certification is required.

No artificial noise makers are allowed. Spectators using air horns, etc. will be escorted out of the building.




















Some days are worth getting slimed!

In a unit on matter and mass, students measured and took the weight of gummy bears, then let them soak in water for 24 hours and took a second set of measurements!

































