Last week, Kalkaska High School hosted suicide prevention speaker and Kalkaska graduate Shandy Longcore. She is the owner and founder of Embracing Imperfections, a company dedicated to suicide prevention and advocacy for those experiencing mental health issues.

According to the Embracing
Imperfections website, one person dies
by suicide in the United States every 12
minutes. During her talk, Longcore also told
her audience that suicide was the second
leading cause of death among individuals
between the ages of 10–14 and 25–34.

★ The main access drive between the


high school and the elementary school is ONE WAY. Do not exit our events to Birch Street. For safety, please obey all posted signs and exit to Dresden Street.

into this concert.












FUN AT KUE

New teacher joins Rapid City

enjoys spending time with her family, hiking, rock collecting, and biking in the great outdoors, and

"I already love each and every student! I am very excited for this school year," she said.

Welcome to Kalkaska, Ms. Klaft.

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The most powerful part of her talk came when she shared her personal experience with suicide when she was 10 years old. A hush fell over the auditorium as she told

her story about getting in a fight with her father about cutting her hair. When he left, she went directly to his gun cabinet, grabbed a rifle, and shot herself in the chest. Her mother, a nurse, came home and found her and was able to get her the help she needed. She eventually made a full recovery.

Now, she encourages students to avoid making impulsive decisions like hers and to talk to someone trustworthy. Her message engaged many of the students and staff alike.

"I just want all of my students to know that there are ways and resources to get help," said KHS Principal Staci Short. Short also thanked Live Well Kalkaska Coalition for Substance Free Living and The Academia Club who helped fund this event.

Counselor Jeremy Guggemos said he

felt like it was a lively
event for such a somber
topic. Longcore did invite
audience participation by
asking questions about
their own feelings and
encouraging them to
ask questions about her
experience as well.

Junior Elizabeth
Trombley appreciated
how difficult it must be to
tell a story like this to a
large group of people.

"Shandy seemed like a very sweet woman," she said. Her message was influential and motivated a lot of students."
