Behind the scenes at the library! Ever wonder how all those new books make it onto your school library's shelves? Say Hello to Jadyn, the library's chief technical services staff person! One of Jadyn's jobs is to catalog books, which involves much more than it might seem. When a book arrives, someone has to figure out which building it belongs to, assign a Dewey Decimal number so it can be sensibly discovered, give it a barcode and RFID tag so it can be tracked system-wide, upload it to the library's online catalog, sometimes assign a Lexile number, and then wrap the book in a protective cover. Jadyn does this thousands of times a year. When we're busy, like we are now at the start of the school year, we must be extra careful walking past Jadyn's work area, because one careless motion and poor Jadyn could be buried under a book avalanche! When she's not cataloging books she's part of the library team at Rapid City Elementary. Thanks for all your hard work, Jadyn! We couldn't make library happen without you!

Reading with your child at Home!

- ★ Encourage your child to read another book Find ways to encourage your child to keep reading. If he or she likes one book, find another book with a similar subject or by the same author. Ask a librarian or teacher for book suggestions.
- Take turns reading Once your child can read, have him or her read aloud to you every day. You can take turns – you read one page and your child the next.
- ★ Make connections to your child's life Help your child make connections between what he or she reads in books and what happens in life. If you're reading a book about a family, for example, talk about what happens in the story being the same or different from what happens in your family.
- Give your child an incentive to read At bedtime, encourage your child to read. Offer a choice between reading or sleeping. Most kids will

choose to read, as long as you don't offer something more tempting (like TV).
