elcome back to school, Blazer family and friends! We are so excited for the new year. Students have new opportunities, new teachers, and new friends. Of course, it's time for some changes ...


Fourth and fifth grade students will <u>now</u> be educated at Kalkaska Upper Elementary School on the expanded campus of Kalkaska Elementary School which also features Birch Street Elementary. Birch Street Elementary will be the "lower elementary," featuring pre–kindergarten through second grade students, and KUE will house the third through fifth grade students in the "upper elementary" section.

On Wednesday, June 14, Cherry Street Intermediate School closed its doors for the last time after several years as the Kalkaska fourth and fifth grade building. Renovations are in process to turn the building into one of the area's only state—of—the—art early childhood centers.

New drop-off and pick-up procedures are in place. The transition to a new drop off/pick up system was necessary as several additional students will be educated in the complex.

Mrs. Arica Zenner will remain as the BSE principal and Mr. Ryan Moore will transition from the middle school to become the first principal at KUE—however, he previously did serve as the CSI principal. Mr. Scott Morey joins the administrative team as the Kalkaska Middle School principal.

Returning Rapid City Rockstars and new Rockstars were welcomed into a warm, comfortable, fun loving learning environment. Rockstars were all smiles their first week back!



District Readies New Strategic Plan

In early August, the Board of Education (BOE), several district employees, students, and community members met for two nights in the central office and worked on a new strategic plan for Kalkaska Public Schools.

The goal of the process was to determine a vision, mission, and core values for KPS as well as to develop themes to build new goals around. At the September 18 Board Meeting, the materials that were developed will be shared with the BOE for approval.

The proposals include the following:

- ★ Vision: Inspiring excellence through perseverance, resilience, and individual success;
- ★ Mission: Supporting families to build successful students;
- Values: Pride—in community, school, and self; Learning—purpose is to create pathways to success for all students; Attitude—self–discipline, integrity, curiosity, compassion, courage, respect, responsibility, honor; Collaboration and Culture—every person feels safe, valued, and encouraged; Excellence—every day we improve.

The planning committee also identified eight theme areas to develop the goals around, including standardizing processes, assessing campuses, evaluating communication processes, assessing working conditions, creating additional meal options and improved nutrition, designing and implementing opportunities to expose younger students to career pathways, identifying ways to connect with all kids, and exploring systems to facilitate relationship building with our students.

School adds 200 students, changes dismissal process

As the new school year has quickly progressed, we have had several questions about why we changed the parent drop-off and pick-up policy at the Kalkaska Elementary School complex. We knew that adding nearly 200 students to the complex was going to complicate things.

We worked with Integrated Designs, Inc. — our engineer and architecture firm — to determine what might work with the new situation. IDI actually performed a transportation study at the site on two different occasions, watching both drop off and pick up. The firm developed a couple of recommendations, including some additional site work to create a new circle drive in front of Birch Street Elementary. (This is something that we may consider down the road, but is cost prohibitive at this point).

We decided to see if we could "create" better transportation options going into the Birch Street school, so we closed off one of the entrances. This requires everyone to come in one specific entrance.

Overall, our goal is to create a process that is both efficient and safe for everyone. We worked with Kalkaska Area Transit and our own bus department to determine a plan for busing. We want the process to work for everyone.

We shifted to the car line due to the increased number of students and the subsequent limited parking.

We continue to work with IDI to determine what will work now and in the future.

The local authorities do not want families parking along the street because of the potential of back ups.

Please continue to be patient and kind to staff as we work to determine the best dismissal strategy.

Dismissal will continue to be at 3 p.m. for the high school, 3:05 p.m. for the elementary schools, and 3:10 p.m. for the middle school. Thank you for your understanding!



LINDA COLVIN


