




Playing music the ukulele way

Friendship, kindness, and love filled the halls as Rockstars exchanged cards, treats and little tokens of appreciation for one another.


































100 Days!!!



Reality hit seniors on February 16 when Forest Area Federal Credit Union came to the high school.

As part of the half—day activity, seniors were given a career, annual income, and a set amount of money in their account to work with for the month. They began by finding a place to live, where they had a few options, including whether or not they wanted a roommate. Students then went station—to—station buying things, deciding how they would eat and dress themselves, and giving to charity.

At the end, students took their information to a financial adviser. If they ended with a positive amount, they had won against reality. If they were in the negative, they would have to give some things up or find a part–time job.

FAFCU representatives planned the event. They met with counselor Jeremy Guggemos and gave him a list of careers to have the seniors choose from. Students chose their careers earlier this year. The event took a long time to schedule. Everyone was a volunteer, and the coordinator had to fit everyone's schedules.

Kerry Wilson teaches Personal Finance at the high school. In her class, students complete many activities to help them learn how to manage money. Students were able to bring their knowledge from this class to the reality fair.

Senior Evan Hardy enjoyed the reality fair, "It was nice because it was similar to things we have done in personal finance."

Wilson decided to join the students and participate in the event. She thought it would be easier to have conversations with students about the activity. As she walked around the fair, she noticed that the students were confident in their choices.

"It was fun, high energy, and the kids had a good time," she said.

Although it was fun, some of the student body felt that it could have had a few minor changes. One student felt that there should have been more options. You had to buy something from every station. They felt students should have been able to opt out of buying some things.

Students enjoyed the break from the classroom to do a less traditional activity

"It was fun to do something different," said Senior Cadence Campbell.

Wilson added that the Reality Fair was just the latest in many activities FAFCU has developed to promote fiscal responsibility over the years.

"Forest Area does a great job supporting the community," said. "They were always active in my classroom every year."
